The 129th Rescue Wing gained a new command chief when Col. Amos Bagdasarian, the 129th Wing Commander, bequethed the guidon to Chief Master Sgt. Kristina Keck in a Change of Authority Ceremony attended by the wing, family and friends Sunday, June 8.

Chief Master Sgt. Keck said she was "excited, honored and humbled to be the new chief for the 129th Rescue Wing," and her number one priority is to create the right environment to provide the enlisted troops the ability to achieve their goals. The new chief replaced Chief Master Sgt. Liliana Ramos, who served 33 years in the Air Force, as the top enlisted individual in the wing.

As the 10th Command Chief at the 129th, Chief Master Sgt. Keck, previously the wing's Human Resource Advisor, brings 21 years of Air Force experience, mulitple deployments in support of Operations Enduring and Iraqi Freedom, and a passion for enlisted members and their training.

Bill Keck, husband to the newly-appointed Chief, said, "I've never been so proud of my wife, ever. She's at the pinnacle of her career."

New San Jose heliport used to transfer SAR #559 patient

Air National Guardsmen from the 129th Rescue Wing performed a medical evacuation June 18 for a crewmember experiencing a medical emergency aboard the cargo vessel APC Peru.

Responding to a call from the Coast Guard District 11 Alameda, two HH-60G Pave Hawk helicopters and two MC-130P Combat Shadow aerial refueling tankers met the vessel approximately 500 miles off the coast of California.

During the rescue operation, specially trained pararescuemen rappelled from the helicopter down to the cargo ship and provided emergency medical treatment to stabilize the patient. The crew then hoisted the patient up to the helicopter and transported him to a local area hospital.

This rescue brings the total number of people saved by the 129th RQW to 559.

"It takes a total team effort to pull off a rescue such as the one performed Wednesday," said Col. Amos Bagdasarian, 129th RQW Commander. "Our Airmen coordinated with various agencies, such as the U.S. Coast Guard and the Regional Medical Center of San Jose, to provide life-saving assistance to the patient. This interagency cooperation is critical for strengthening ties and preparing us to respond to local disasters and state emergencies."

The rescue helicopter landed at the Regional Medical Center of San Jose's new heliport at approximately 9:30 p.m. and transferred the patient to awaiting hospital personnel. The heliport, which just debuted earlier this month, is the first in the area to be certified for use by the 129th Rescue Wing's HH-60G Pave Hawk helicopter.

Heliport certified by 129th

While patients, nurses, doctors and construction workers stared

in awe, an HH-60G Pave Hawk helicopter from the 129th Rescue Wing landed at the Regional Medical Center of San Jose June 9.

This Pave Hawk wasn't landing at the hospital for a rescue mission. It was the unit's maiden landing on a heliport that is the first in the Bay Area to be certified for use by the 129th RQW.

The Regional Medical Center recently completed construction of the large metallic elevated structure. The hospital partnered with the 129th RQW, nonprofit air ambulance CALSTAR and the U.S. Coast Guard to open up the heliport for business.

Community members and hospital staff were invited to take part in the opening festivities and become acquainted with the various rescue aircraft. Aircrew members and pararescuemen answered questions and talked about their search and rescue duties.

In the past, patients rescued by the 129th RQW were transported via ambulance from Moffett Federal Airfield to area hospitals. Landings also occurred on a Stanford University campus soccer field, where ambulances would then transport patients to the Stanford University Medical Center.

Regional's heliport will increase the unit's ability to obtain expeditious care for rescued persons, said Capt. David Weidman, 129th Rescue Squadron HH-60 pilot.

The Regional Medical Center's heliport not only gives the wing an additional conduit for saving lives during typical search and rescue missions, but also for rescues in response to disasters. As an Air National Guard unit, many of the 129th's past missions involved supporting the Governor's office during state emergencies, which included earthquakes, chemical spills, fires and floods.



Portrait of a Professional -- Senior Airman Hong Zhou, 129th LRS

What is your favorite memory in the military?

Wing maintenance, logistics to merge with operations

WASHINGTON (AFPN) -- On May 12, Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. T. Michael Moseley signed the Global Wing Structure Program Action Directive 08-01. PAD 08-01 directs the realignment of fighter, rescue and bomber aircraft maintenance units under flying squadrons.

The Air Force will implement these changes between July 1 and Nov. 30. Major command officials will determine on what specific dates each participating wing will implement these changes.

Aligning aircraft maintenance units responsible for sortie generation together with the flying squadrons they support provides combatant commanders with the most complete and capable fighting squadrons possible, officials said. It also allows the operations group commander to focus on the generation and employment of airpower. In short, it generates the mission generation command chain.

A new materiel group at winglevel will create a new structure that is aligned to better support the logistics enterprise, flying wings and combatant commanders. The logistics readiness squadron, aerial support squadron and the remaining maintenance squadrons form the materiel group and will consolidate traditional logistics functions under a single logistics leader in the wing. The global wing structure also positions the logistics community for future transformation initiatives.

101 Critical Days of Summer Airman's Roll Call

The summer season is upon us, and brings with it sunny days, family vacations and barbecues with friends. Unfortunately, though, the season also brings increased risks and opportunities for reckless behavior from which none of us are immune. By focusing on safety, mishaps and fatalities can be avoided. Airmen should be aware of the risks and consequences associated with dangerous behavior as we enter the 101 Critical Days of Summer.

Airmen are encouraged to evaluate their behavior and be

good Wingmen to one another. Understanding high-risk behavior and taking steps to reduce the chances of mishaps, injuries and fatalities saves lives. Sadly, we lost 19 Airmen last summer, two more than the previous year. The majority of those losses were from vehicle mishaps-eight were in four-wheel vehicles and seven were in motorcycle mishaps. Incidentally, the factors involved in these mishaps included speeding, alcohol and not using seat belts-all risks that are easily correctable.

Now that warmer weather is here, keep the following points in mind while planning your activities:

- Risk management is a tool to assist us in fighting these summer hazards. It can be done on the fly, anywhere, anytime, by anyone. Simply ask yourself: What am I doing? What can go wrong? Could I hurt myself or others? What actions can I take to reduce or eliminate danger?

- Be a good Wingman. This involves watching each others' backs to prevent injury or loss of life. A good Wingman will recognize risky behavior and have the courage to speak up.

- Make safety a habit. Wear seatbelts in cars and required protective equipment on motorcycles. Remain alert while at the wheel and plan rest breaks at frequent intervals. Don't speed – it is better to arrive late than not arrive at all.

> Don't drink and drive. Anticipate the unexpected and be ready to react.

> Enjoy your summer season; use the tools available to ensure you and your Wingman survive it.

GTC usage and travel advance policy

Public law requires all DoD personnel to use the Government Travel Card (GTC) for all expenses arising from official government travel unless othenvise exempted (i.e., new recruits, invitational travel, etc.).

Effective immediately, the GTC will be used for all authorized travel expenses during temporary duty, deployment, and permanent change of station travel. This also includes cash advances via the GTC in lieu of travel advances processed through the base level financial services office. Centrally Billed Accounts will only be used for those individuals who are exempt from having a GTC.
