California Air Guard holds first Hometown Heroes Salute Awards Ceremony

California Air National Guard's 129th Rescue Wing honored 109 Airmen and their families at the Hometown Heroes Salute Award Ceremony at Moffett Federal Airfield Aug. 7, 2010.

Recognized in this ceremony were Guardsmen that have deployed in support of Operations Enduring Freedom, Iraqi Freedom, Noble Eagle and other peacekeeping operations across the globe since Sept. 11, 2001 through April 15, 2010, who have not previously been recognized.

In August 2008, Gen. Craig R. McKinley, chief of the National Guard Bureau, sanctioned the ANG Hometown Heroes Salute recognition program. The purpose of this program is to celebrate and honor Airmen, families, communities and those special supporters who have significantly contributed to supporting our Airmen and the ANG's mission.

In order to properly recognize the sacrifices of eligible guardsmen, awards are presented in a two-phase campaign. Phase I includes all eligible ANG members deployed for 30-179 consecutive days. Phase II was implemented January 2010 to include members deployed for more than 180 consecutive days.

All recognized Airmen receive a framed Letter of Appreciation signed by the ANG director and command chief master sergeant that contains the Hometown Heroes Salute coin. Members recognized in phase II, depending on their deployment length, also receive a framed American flag or Hometown Heroes eagle statue.

The honored Airmen's spouse, or significant other, receives an engraved pen/pencil set with the ANG Hometown Heroes Salute Logo. The Airman's children receive unique Hometown Heroes Salute dog tags. Lastly, each honored Airman receives one Hometown Heroes Salute Logo Medallion to recognize their center of influence for outstanding support during their deployment.

What is your favorite memory in the AF?

Well I have a lot of great memories, however most of them are stupid stories that appeal to my sense of humor. In tech school I actually got pushed into being a green rope against my will and we had groups of Airmen to take care. One of my guys was from North Dakota and had never seen a cockroach before in his life and its Virginia so they were all over this place in our dorms. So it was our second night there and this giant cockroach crawls across the middle of the room and he absolutely freaked out. He started throwing paperwork everywhere. It was like watching 'I Love Lucy' or something because he was standing on top of the chair, scared. He was screaming at the top of his lungs, I have never laughed that hard before in my life.

What would people be surprised to know about you?

All four years of school I was in Air Force JROTC color guard and drill team. I slung rifles, did award ceremonies and stuff like that.

What's the most important lesson you've learned in the military?

I would have to say this it's something directly related with my job, and that's accountability. Being really responsible for everything in your possession, from the equipment you check out to the hardware you take with you to do a job. In our career, leaving something, such as a small washer, could cause catastrophic failure to the aircraft and cost someone their life. It's funny to think back when I was younger I just threw laundry on the ground and I never thought I would have to change that method. Around here I'm so paranoid about stuff like that. That's one of the more valuable lessons I've learned.

How has being an Airman changed your outlook on life?

Its let me see things I never thought I would actually get to see. I've traveled the world, only to Afghanistan and back, but I've seen things that have really made me grow up and mature. I've grown more so in these three years that in the last ten before I enlisted. It's definitely improved the character of the man.

If you could deploy anywhere in the world, where would you go?

I would go to Germany. We went through there briefly on our way to Afghanistan last year and I only got to see a little bit of it. It really looked like a beautiful country and the kind of place I would like to roam around in and check out some sights.

If you could choose any AF job, which would it be?

I actually spend a lot of time considering my options for jobs, even at an early age. When I was growing up, my best friends dad was a helicopter crop duster pilot and I've always wanted to be involved with just that. I've always considered opportunities to get involved with helicopters, and it just didn't seem that I could do anything outside of crop dusting from where I grew up. So I started doing a little research and found out about this career field and the Guard. I wouldn't want to do anything else if I had the choice. However, if they every opened unmanned aerial vehicle piloting to the enlisted career field, I would love to try that.

Where did you grow up?

Bakersfield, Ca.

What are your hobbies?

I like to you around and play with computers quite a bit, I regularly go hiking. I usually try to go camping every winter in the snow. Up in the Sierras, it's my favorite time to go.

Air Guard Families Encouraged to Register with AFPAAS

The lifestyle we adapt as a military family is to prepare for the separation from our Guardsmen as they annually train to be "ready to deploy."

Families should also adapt the mindset and learned behavior to prepare to evacuate in case of natural disasters, prepare a shelter-in-place, or seek refuge when traveling if they encounter a disaster.

While we would inherently attempt to contact our Guardsmen to inform them of our whereabouts, it's encouraged as an additional safety net to report our whereabouts to proper authorities.

The Air National Guard, keeping pace with our Air Force counterparts, has made available the Air Force Personnel Accountability and Assessment System.

The AFPAAS is a website designed to help Air Force personnel and their families directly affected by natural and man-made disasters allowing them to update their current accountability status.

The website provides a tool to report families status, current location, update emergency contact information and request assistance.

AFPAAS helps the Air Force leadership to account for personnel and to make decisions that support Guardsmen and their families.


Without question, Air Guard families should add to their knowledge bank, this timely reporting and tracking tool, to identify their well-being and whereabouts in times of emergencies.

Timely News For Deployers

Combat And Other Hazardous-Duty Entitlements Remain For Troops Serving In Iraq

The change from Operation Iraqi Freedom to Operation New Dawn does not affect combat and other hazardous-duty entitlements troops serving in Iraq receive, a Pentagon spokeswoman said today. Servicemembers deployed to Iraq will still receive hostile fire/imminent danger pay, hardship-duty pay, and incidental expenses. Some troops will qualify for family separation allowances. Also, all pay for warrant officers and enlisted members is tax exempt, while officers are exempt from taxes for up to \$7,611.30 each month they serve in an eligible area. While supporting joint operations in Afghanistan with the 83rd Expeditionary Rescue Squadron, the 131st Rescue Squadron has earned the 129th Rescue Wing an additional 7 combat saves since the last reporting period. Saves included local nationals, U.S. military members and Afghan National Army soldiers. The 131st RQS current deployment statistics include 37 saves, 137 assists and 136 missions.

United States Senate Youth Program Seeks Delegates from DoDEA

The United States Senate Youth Program, established in 1962 by U.S. Senate Resolution, is a unique educational experience for outstanding high school students interested in pursuing careers in public service. The 49th annual program will be held in Washington, D.C., from March 5 - 12, 2011. Two student leaders from each state, the District of Columbia and the Department of Defense Education Activity will spend a week in Washington experiencing their national government in action. Student delegates will hear major policy addresses by Senators, cabinet members, officials from the Departments of State and Defense and directors of other federal agencies, as well as participate in a meeting with a Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. All transportation, hotel and meal expenses will be provided by The Hearst Foundations. In addition, each delegate will also be awarded a \$5,000 College Scholarship for undergraduate studies, with encouragement to pursue coursework in history and political science. ANG youth are eligible. TRICARE Retired Reserve Launches

For the first time, members of the Retired Reserve who are not yet age 60, the so-called "gray area" retirees, can purchase TRICARE health coverage for themselves and their eligible family members with the Sept. 1, 2010 launch of TRICARE Retired Reserve. Retired Reservists may qualify to purchase TRR coverage if they are under the age of 60 and are not eligible for, or enrolled in, the Federal Employees Health Benefits (FEHB) program. They must also be members of the Retired Reserve of a Reserve component and qualified for non-regular retirement. For instructions on how to qualify for and purchase TRR go to www.tricare.mil/trr. For calendar year 2010, the TRR member-only monthly premium is \$388.31 (\$4,659.72 yearly), and the member and family monthly premium is \$976.41 (\$11,716.92 yearly). Premiums will be adjusted annually. The comprehensive health care coverage provided by the premium-based TRR is similar to TRICARE Standard. After purchasing TRR, members will receive the *TRICARE Retired Reserve Handbook*, which includes details about covered services, how to get care and who to contact for assistance. Christopher Underwood, the 129th Rescue Wing Human Resource Advisor, who was a member in the audience. "On the other hand he communicated his "optimism" regarding his initiatives to heighten support and funding for servicemembers in uniform, reduction in contract spending, the state of Iraq 10 years from now."
