The Department of Veterans Affairs is reaching out to veterans, both those who use the VA home-loan guaranty program and those who don't, to keep people in their homes. Depending on a veteran's circumstances, VA counselors can intercede with the borrower on the veteran's behalf to pursue options that would allow a veteran to keep his or her home.

Air National Guardsmen Called to Assist Ground Firefighting Capt. Alyson Teeter

MOFFETT FEDERAL AIRFIELD, Calif. - The 129th Rescue Wing is mobilizing approximately 30 Airmen to provide direct ground support to help CAL FIRE with the current wildfire threat in Northern California.

CAL FIRE has trained the 129th Airmen on firefighting techniques. This group of 129th Airmen is part of the 2,000 Guardsmen ordered by the Governor to provide ground support.

Personnel reported to the Wildland Fire Training Center (WFTC) at McClellan Air Park July 23 to train on fire behavior, fire safety, and how to create fire containment lines using hand tools. After completing training, the Guardsmen are available to support CAL FIRE, and the firefighter training remains current for one year after completion.

In addition to ground support personnel, the 129th also provided two HH-60 Pave Hawk helicopters for fighting various northern California wildfires. Since July 3, the aircraft and crews have dropped more than 150,000 gallons of water. One aircraft remains stationed at Chico, Calif.

An MC-130P Combat Shadow tanker and crew stationed here remains on stand-by to support firefighting operations. The 129th Rescue Wing and California National Guard works in support of the Governor and civilian responders and will continue to be deployed in the affected area as long as needed.

Guard and Reserve Get New GI Bill

Members of the Guard and Reserve are slated to get a brand new GI Bill benefit that surpasses anything offered to Reserve Component members in the last 20 years.

This benefit will not go into effect until August 1, 2009. Many details are still being sorted out.

Many Guard and Reserve servicemembers and veterans activated since Sept. 11, 2001 will soon see a new package of education benefits. This new Post 9/11 GI Bill boasts a comprehensive education benefits package and, best of all, it offers National Guardsmen and Reserves the same benefits as their active-duty counterparts.

The new bill goes well beyond helping to pay for tuition; many veterans who served after Sept. 11, 2001, will get full tuition and fees, a new monthly housing stipend, and a \$1,000 a year stipend for books and supplies. The new bill also gives Reserve and Guard members who have been activated for more than 90 days since 9/11 access to the same GI Bill benefits.

If you are in the Guard or Reserve or are a veteran who served at least 90 consecutive days on active duty in the Armed Forces since Sept. 11, 2001, you're eligible. However, the amount of benefits you receive under this program are determined by the actual amount of accumulated post 9/11 active-duty service you have. To be eligible for the **full benefit**, you must have 36 months of active duty service since Sept. 11, 2001 or have been discharged due to a service-connected disability.

Unlike the Montgomery GI Bill, the new GI Bill will allow you to use this benefit for up to 15 years from your last period of active duty of at least 90 consecutive days.

Jim was born in Minot, North Dakota on 23 June 1947. In 1948, his family moved to California where he attended St. John School, later graduating from San Lorenzo High School in 19665, and California State University Hayward. In 1971 Jim graduated as a 2nd Lieutenant from the Laughlin US Air Force 3646 Pilot Training Wing, Undergraduate Pilot Training in San Antonio, Texas. It was there he materialized his long-held dream of flight. He broke the sound barrier with the F4 and flew the curvature of the earth. For the following 20 years he proudly flew the C130 as a search and rescue pilot for the California Air National Guard. Jim retired from the military as a Colonel in 2000.

In 1987, he married his lovely bride, Marilyn, in Napa, California, at which time he became the proud stepfather of Scott Soares. He was later blessed with two beautiful grandchildren, Vinny and Paolo, and a lovely daughter-in-law, Ula Soares.

In addition, Jim is survived by his parents, Lorna and Barnard Adams; sisters, Penny Newton-Tibbetts, Phyllis Newton-Carpenter, Patricia Newton-Suda, and Paula Newton-Molgaard; and many nieces and nephews.

Jim faced many challenges with his diabetes, none of which deterred him. In 1998, he participated in a cutting edge experimental gene therapy trial at St. Elizabeth Medical Center, Boston, Mass. Jim later volunteered at the Chabot Space and Science Center. As a docent, he shared his vast knowledge of space and quantum physics.

Later what brought Jim his greatest joy were the children in his life. He lived each day for the opportunity to share treasured moments, knowing they were fleeting.







Lt Col Leonard James Pringle 22 March 1943 – 1 June 2008



Leonard James Pringle, Lt Colonel, Retired, USAF/ANG was born on March 22, 1943, in Spencer, Iowa. He passed away on June 1, 2008, in Concord, CA. His wife of 38 years, Chloie, and his two sons, James and John, survive him. Len was an extremely active person working a full time job for many years with Motorola Communications and then his own business. All this time he was an active HAM Radio Operator using the call signs of K6JJC, KH8A, W6LT and W7NZ to communicate with others all over the world. He was an Air National Guardsman for over 31 years being recalled for the Pueblo Crisis. He was commissioned and served as the Communications Flight Commander for the Reno Air Guard, the Director of Operations and Squadron Commander for the 234th Combat Communications Squadron, Squadron Commander for the

216th Electronic Installations Squadron, and was the Deputy Commander of the 162nd Combat Communications Group at the time of retirement. A memorial service was held at the Chapel of San Ramon Valley on June 8th and internment service was at the Sacramento Valley VA National Cemetery with Military Honors provided by the Travis AFB CA honor guard.

McKinley Named Chief National Guard Bureau

Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates recommended the Air National Guard's director for a promotion that would make him the first four-star general in National Guard history. Pending nomination by President Bush and confirmation by the Senate, Air Force Lt. Gen. Craig R. McKinley would become the chief of the National Guard Bureau.

McKinley would succeed Army Lt. Gen. H Steven Blum. Gates has recommended that the president nominate Blum to be deputy commander of U.S. Northern Command.

As director of the Air Guard, McKinley has been responsible for overseeing all policies, plans and programs affecting more than 104,000 Guardsmen in 88 flying units and 200 geographically separated bases in the United States and its territories.

The independent Commission on the National Guard and Reserves recommended the chief of the National Guard Bureau be a four-star position. Congress agreed and made the recommendation law as part of the fiscal 2008 National Defense Authorization Act.

The promotion also recognizes that the chief will serve as a bridge for the states to the federal government and the active components of the military. McKinley "will provide the leadership that will take the National Guard to the next level," Blum said in a written message to Guard units today. "He is a competent, caring, and proven leader."

Veterans History Project Allows People to Share Experiences

SAN ANTONIO (AFRNS) -- The Veterans History Project collects and preserves the remembrances of American war veterans and civilian workers who supported them. These collections of first-hand accounts are archived in the American Folklife Center at the Library of Congress for use by researchers and to serve as an inspiration for generations to come.

The program is designed to preserve the legacies of America's aging veterans who are dying at the rate of about 1,500 a day.

"Getting these oral histories now is important, because once they are gone, their stories are gone forever," said Steve Hollingshead from the Department of Veterans Affairs' Media Services Division.

The project collects remembrances of veterans who served in World War I, World War II, the Cold War, Korean War, Vietnam War, Persian Gulf War (1990-1995), or Afghanistan and Iraq conflicts (2001-present). Citizen civilians who actively supported war efforts (such as war industry workers, USO workers, flight instructors, medical volunteers, defense contractors, etc.) are also invited to share their valuable stories.

Interviews taped through the program go on file at the Library of Congress, where they are available for researchers, and the veteran gets a personal DVD copy, Mr. Hollingshead explained.

But while the program initially focused on older veterans, Mr. Hollingshead said, he is increasingly seeing veterans from Iraq and Afghanistan participating in the project.

The younger veterans' stories are different from those of earlier generations, Mr. Hollingshead said. They served in different wars, carrying out different missions and applying different kinds of warfare. Their wounds are different today, with traumatic brain injuries and amputations more prevalent than in the past.

But despite these differences, Mr. Hollingshead said, he sees a common thread among the veterans he interviews. Whether they served in World War I or Operation Iraqi Freedom, or in some conflict in between, all recognize that "they were there, fighting for their country," he said.

"All of them love their country and are here for all the right reasons," Mr. Hollingshead said. "The patriotism you see in these people is just phenomenal."

All Americans, including students and grandchildren, can participate in documenting the lives of the nation's war veterans, Mr. Hollingshead said.

The history project relies on volunteers throughout the nation to collect veterans' stories on behalf of the Library of Congress. These stories are made available to researchers and the general public, both at the library in Washington and via the VHP Web site at <u>http://www.loc.gov/vets/vets-home.html</u>.

The U.S. Congress created the Veterans History Project in 2000. The authorizing legislation (Public Law 106-380), sponsored by Representatives Ron Kind, Amo Houghton and Steny Hoyer in the U.S. House of Representatives, and Senators Max Cleland and Chuck Hagel in the U.S. Senate, received unanimous support and was signed into law by President Clinton in October 2000. VA Raises GI Bill Payment Rates

The Department of Veterans Affairs has announced that the Montgomery GI Bill will soon be increased by 20 percent -- a total increase of nearly \$220 a month increase over last year's rate. The full-time student payment rate of \$1,321 multiplied by the 36-month brings the GI Bill to over \$47,500. If you are GI Bill eligible and have benefits remaining, you get this increase no matter when you became eligible or begin using it.

Retirees Eligible for Payments

Former Airmen receiving military retired pay who served less than 20 years may now be eligible to receive Air Force <u>Combat-Related Special Compensation</u> (http://www.military.com/benefits/military-pay/special-pay/combat-related-special-compensation). If you receive retired pay, have a compensable VA disability of 10 percent or higher, and your retired pay is reduced by VA disability payments, then you should submit your CRSC claim if you have not already done so.
